When the trees are cut down, the deserts grow. Once, even the Great Sahara was covered by forest. The trees hold the soil and the water. They shade the land. Without them, the Earth becomes cracked and dry.

In the century to come, over one half of your fertile soil could vanish, and at the same time,

My uncle is a Zen priest, he tells me that the Earth is owned by no one. That real wealth comes from the health of the Earth and all living things.
